## PREPARE FOR THE MCAT

Almost all medical schools require applicants to take the MCAT. The test was recently revised in 2015 to include a section that focuses on the social sciences, in recognition of the growing need for well-rounded doctors who understand how psychological and behavioral issues can impact a patient's overall health.

### GATHER TRANSCRIPTS + RECOMMENDATION LETTERS

When you apply to medical school, you'll need to supply each institution with evidence of your academic, professional and personal achievements. It takes time to collect these materials, so we advise you to start requesting these items as early as possible.

### **TRANSCRIPTS**

Contact the registrar's office at your former institution(s) and ask them to mail your transcripts directly\* to the admissions offices at the medical schools where you plan to apply.

\*If you completed your undergraduate degree at a non-U.S. institution, you may need to have your transcript translated and evaluated by an approved NACES agency such as World Educational Services.

### **RECOMMENDATION LETTERS**

At UMHS, we require two letters of recommendation for each applicant. At least one letter should come from a science professor or an advisor from your pre-med or postbaccalaureate program. The other letter can come from a direct supervisor in any health-care related job or volunteer position. Each letter should be mailed in directly from the source.



- 1. Fill out your application and submit your application fee.

  Apply online to UMHS at UMHS.ORG/APPLY
- 2. Write your essay. UMHS requires two short answer questions (50-200 words each), and one personal statement (250-500 words). Submit it via the online application.
- 3. Send in your transcripts and recommendations. (See Step 3 for details.)
- 4. Report your test scores by uploading a screenshot in the document upload section of the online application. (We require all U.S. citizens and permanent residents to submit MCAT scores. International students whose principal language is not English must submit TOEFL or IELTS scores. Puerto Rican residents are not required to take TOEFL.)

# ACE YOUR INTERVIEW

The interview round is the home stretch of the medical school application and enrollment process. In order to clinch your offer of admission, you must make a lasting impression on your interviewer.
